PQ Question: To ask the Minister for Health for an itemised breakdown of how the 2023 mental health budget allocation was spent; what percentage of the allocation was spent; and if he will make a statement on the matter. -Holly Cairns

Dear Deputy Cairns,

The Health Service Executive has been requested to reply directly to you in the context of the above Parliamentary Question, which you submitted to the Minister for Health for response. I have examined the matter and the following outlines the position.

The attached table outlines the Mental Health expenditure in 2023 split by annual financial statement (AFS) category. It should be noted that this expenditure of €1.3billion excludes expenditure that falls outside of the Mental Health care group but is Mental Health, relates for example PCRS Mental Health drugs which falls under central HSE expenditure. The attached includes all costs for providing existing levels of service.

Mental Health finished the 2023 financial year with expenditure of €1,307m versus a budget of €1,278m resulting in an overspend of €29m. This overspend primarily relates to Agency and Overtime premium expenditure. HSE Mental Health services are currently unable to recruit vacant full time positions and must resort to utilising more expensive agency staffing providers to order to ensure safe levels of care for service users.

Agency and Overtime in Mental Health can be split into 3 distinct categories:

- Nursing/Support agency is mainly approved to fill rosters in acute psychiatric inpatient units that have vacancies due to various statutory leave entitlements and staff turnover.
- Nursing/Support agency relating to medically prescribed special observations for individual patients. This allocation is required to ensure patient safety and generally requires nurse resourcing outside that which the ward complement accommodates.
- Medical agency which predominately relates to consultant psychiatrists and NCHDs which services have been unable to fill through formal recruitment processes but deemed essential for patient safety and clinical governance in mental health teams.

Other contributory factors relate to non-pay inflation whereby price increases over the last number of years across a range of utilities have been absorbed by Mental Health services and is leading to financial deficits.
