Dear Deputy Nolan

To ask the Minister for Health for the costs incurred to date in the development and rollout a public awareness campaign You, Me & HIV

The HSE's You, Me and HIV campaign aims to address misconceptions and help reduce the stigma experienced by people living with HIV in Ireland. The campaign features people living with HIV and their loved ones and was developed in close collaboration with them, as well as community and voluntary groups. In a recent survey\* 7 in 10 people did not know that when a person living with HIV is on effective treatment, they cannot pass it on to sexual partners.

Research\*\* has found that late diagnosis is often related to fear of diagnosis and stigma, highlighting the need to reduce stigma around HIV and testing.

The latest figures\*\*\* from the Health Protection Surveillance Centre (HPSC) show a decrease in the rate of first-time HIV diagnoses in Ireland in 2023. However, nearly two in five people (39%) were diagnosed late.

Costs to date for the campaign (up to the end of March 2025), including research, creative development, production, media buying and materials is c. €490k
