

Conference Speaker Biographies

Kate Killeen White, Regional Executive Officer, HSE Dublin and Midlands



Kate Killeen White took up her role as Regional Executive Officer, HSE Dublin and Midlands on March 1st 2024. Kate has joined HSE Dublin and Midlands from her role as Chief Officer for South East Community Healthcare where, since 2019, she had operational responsibility for delivery of all HSE community services in Carlow, Kilkenny, South Tipperary, Waterford and Wexford, leading a workforce of nearly 5000 staff. She was previously Head of Service for Social Care in South East Community Healthcare, Chief Executive Officer of St. Catherine's Association disability service, and practised as a Barrister from 2008 to 2013.

Kate has more than 16 years senior operational experience across health, regulatory and legal environments. With a strong academic background including Barrister-at-Law degree, Masters in Law, Executive Diploma in Governance and an Executive Diploma in Coaching, she brings a specialist knowledge of Health Law and Policy, Public Administration, Corporate Governance, Corporate and Commercial Law including corporate re-structuring and reform and change management strategies and principles, to this important new post.

Rachel Kenna, Chief Nursing Officer, Department of Health

Rachel Kenna is the Chief Nursing Officer (CNO) for Ireland and was appointed to the post in June 2020. Rachel was formerly a Deputy Chief Nursing Officer leading on nursing and midwifery policy for patient systems, safety, and governance. She is a Registered Children's and General Nurse (RCN/RGN) and has extensive clinical and managerial experience, spanning 30 years in Ireland and the UK across a wide variety of clinical areas. Prior to her roles in the Department of Health, Rachel was Director of Nursing in Ireland's largest Children's teaching Hospital with national responsibility for the provision of quaternary and tertiary healthcare services.

The Chief Nursing Officer role is an important strategic leadership and influencing role providing professional policy direction and evidence-based expert advice for Government on nursing, midwifery, and general health policy development. Rachel has a real interest in health policy and brings a knowledgeable clinical practice, patient, system and governance perspective to its development and implementation. The development of flexible nursing and midwifery policy to ensure the professions are in the best position to meet population need is a particular focus for Rachel and includes a real passion about nurturing the next generation of healthcare leaders. As an Assistant Secretary in the Department of Health, the CNO in addition to Nursing and Midwifery policy has a wide health policy portfolio. These include professional regulation oversight (medical council, CORU and NMBI), strategic workforce planning across the health service, population health screening and the National Patient Safety Office.

Rachel 's interest in global health policy includes active membership of the WHO European region Government Chief Nursing and Midwifery Officers Hub contributing to strengthening the nursing and midwifery workforce to improve health outcomes.

She is educated in a wide range of areas to support her in her role and holds an MSc in Child Protection and Welfare and a BSc in Nursing Management. Rachel's other educational qualifications includes a Higher Diploma in Professional Practice, Critical Care Nursing, Leadership and Quality in Healthcare, a Diploma in Human Rights and Equality and a Professional Diploma in Governance. Rachel is also a Florence Nightingale Leadership graduate.



Neil Dunne, Director of Public Health Nursing, Dublin South City, Dublin South, Kildare & West Wicklow CHO



Neil is a Registered General Nurse, Registered Midwife, Registered Children's Nurse, Registered Public Health Nurse, Registered Advanced Nurse Practitioner and has an MSc in Advanced Practice. Neil has worked as a Director of Public Health Nursing services based in primary care Dublin South City, CHO7 since 2015. He provides clinical leadership and management support to various specialist community nursing teams such as the Community Intervention Team (Southside CIT), Continence Promotion Unit, Integrated Care Chronic Disease, Older Persons Teams/ICPOP and the development of community CNS/ ANP roles. Neil is a scholarship graduate on the Florence Nightingale Foundation "Senior Leaders Program" 2019-2020. He is currently the chair of the National Directors of Public Health Nurse Forum. Completing the FNF scholarship in 2019 afforded Neil the opportunity to critically look at his leadership role within public health nursing.

Oliver Mernagh, Area Director of Nursing, Dublin South Central Mental Health

Oliver Mernagh has worked in the health services since the 1980s and is in the role of Area Director of Nursing since 2018. He has worked in a wide variety of national and international settings and that experience has shaped his approach to fostering high standards of care and leading on innovation and patient centred care. His responsibilities include development and coordination of the mental health services with overall responsibility for nursing and related services. He takes a lead role in the strategic planning, development and continuous improvement of services in line with evidence based best practice and legislative requirements. Oliver is a registered general and psychiatric nurse and holds post graduate qualifications in management and leadership. He is a strong advocate for advancing nursing practice and research.



Professor Jonathan Drennan, Professor of Nursing, School of Nursing, Midwifery and Health Systems, University College Dublin



Professor Jonathan Drennan is Professor of Nursing at the School of Nursing, Midwifery and Health Systems, University College Dublin. He previously held professorships at University College Cork and the University of Southampton. Professor Drennan has undertaken research in Ireland and the UK on nurse and midwife prescribing, cancer information services, research priorities for nursing and midwifery, safe nurse staffing and advanced practice. He presented to and advised the National Institute for Health and Care Excellence (NICE) Safe Staffing Advisory Committees on staffing in medical and surgical wards and accident and emergency departments in the UK. This was part of the development process of the NICE guidelines on safe staffing.

Professor Drennan is currently a member of the Department of Health taskforce involved in the development of guidelines for safe nurse staffing and skill mix in the healthcare sector. He is currently leading a Health Research Board and Department of Health funded study on safe staffing in medical, surgical, emergency and older person's settings in Ireland. Professor Drennan is also part of a European and US research team that have been awarded a grant from the EU Horizon 2020 research programme. The title of the research, Magnet4Europe, develops and implements a theory-based organizational redesign in 64 hospitals in six European countries and involves one-to-one twinning between hospitals in Europe and hospitals in the US with the aim of improving the health and wellbeing of healthcare staff and enhancing the working environment. Professor Drennan was also appointed to the Expert Review Body on Nursing and Midwifery by the Minister of Health, Stephen Donnelly and is one of the authors of the Report that was launched in January 2022.

Barbara Egan, ICUsteps

Barbara is Chairperson of ICUsteps Dublin. Her experience of being critically ill prompted her to establish this group in 2015 along with her husband Jimmy, ICU nurses, former ICU patients and relatives. ICUsteps Dublin is affiliated with ICUsteps.org and they acknowledge the need for ongoing support to patients and family members following critical illness. Their monthly support group meetings began in March 2015 and transitioned from face to face meetings to zoom in March 2020 due to the COVID pandemic. Their support is extended countrywide. There are patient/relative information leaflets in every ICU in Ireland. Barbara is PPI on the ICU Audit Governance Committee with NOCA (National Office of Clinical Audit), ICSI council (Intensive Care Society of Ireland) and ICC-CTN (Irish Critical Care-Clinical Trials Network). Barbara is an advocate for ICU aftercare. Barbara is mother to two grown up sons. She works as a Psychotherapist. She enjoys sea swimming and walking in nature, practising mindfulness and connecting with people.



Professor Richard Greene Chief Clinical Information Officer, HSE



Professor Richard Greene, a graduate of Trinity College Dublin, gained much of his clinical experience at the Coombe Women's and Infants' University Hospital, Dublin and as a Fellow in Maternal-Fetal Medicine in Thomas Jefferson University Hospital, Philadelphia, USA. He is a Consultant in Obstetrics and Gynaecology; Director of the National Perinatal Epidemiology Centre (NPEC) and Professor of Clinical Obstetrics, UCC. He is the HSE's CCIO working between the office of the Chief Information Officer and the Office of the Chief Clinical officer, assisting the multidisciplinary working for a digital health future.

His digital health experience includes concept to go-live of a national electronic health record for maternity services and he remains centrally involved in the Maternal Newborn Clinical Management System project team; development of the business case for a national eHR, the Covid Care tracker system in March 2020 and various other projects in digital health over the last 2 years. He believes digital data and information flow between patients/service users and healthcare staff is the key enabler for healthcare transformation in Ireland.

Kasia Nolan, Area Director of Mental Health Nursing, Waterford/Wexford Mental Health Services

Kasia has over 33 years of nursing experience, with 23 years of these in nursing management and leadership with particular expertise in developing clinical capacity in senior nurse leaders and driving strategic change management in integrated mental health service delivery. Since taking up her current role in 2016, Kasia has led a range of change, crisis and service transformation programmes across mental health nursing services in Waterford and Wexford with key outcomes including Nurse led excellence as part of the senior leadership team in Mental Health Commission regulatory compliance, implementation of nursing assignments to National Clinical Care Programmes and National Models of Care and advanced and specialist psychiatric nursing role development in line with national health priorities. Kasia graduated with a Bachelor of Nursing Studies from Trinity College Dublin, a Post-graduate Diploma in Public Management and MA in Health Service Management-Institute of Public Administration. Kasia has completed further courses in areas of Executive Leadership and has a great interest in the area of Nurse Leadership in Mental Health Services.



Eileen Whelan, Chief Director of Nursing & Midwifery, Dublin Midlands Hospital Group

Eileen was appointed Chief Director of Nursing & Midwifery in 2015 and was simultaneously appointed Director of Quality and Patient Safety (2015 – 2020). She provided leadership at both Hospital Group and national level during the COVID-19 pandemic, and was appointed interim National Director for the COVID-19 Vaccination, Test and Contact Tracing Programme from June 2022 to November 2023.

Eileen is accountable for professional practice and standards of the Nursing & Midwifery workforce and is dedicated to driving the quality & safety agenda for patients, service users and their families. Eileen is committed to the reform agenda set out in the Sláintecare Strategy and she is a member of the Regional Health Advisory Group leading on the future integration of health services in Ireland.

Eileen is an adjunct Professor at the School of Nursing and Midwifery Trinity College Dublin and a Fellow of the Faculty of Nursing & Midwifery, RCSI. She is a MBA graduate from the Smurfit School of Business, UCD (2003), and is a Fellow of the NHS Education for Scotland, Scottish Patient Safety Fellowship Programme (2013 - 2014). She was the first registered nurse in Ireland to receive the prestigious award of a Florence Nightingale Scholarship in March 2018. Eileen completed her undergraduate nursing studies in University Hospital Limerick and gained postgraduate qualifications and experience in both the UK and Australia.

Eileen is a "retired snowboarder" and enjoys skiing, cycling, hill walking and GAA (Limerick Hurling & Kerry Football).



Keynote Speaker Professor Ian Robertson, Clinical Psychologist and Neuroscientist, Trinity College Dublin



Ian Robertson is Emeritus Professor of Psychology at Trinity College Dublin and Co-Director of the Global Brain Health Institute. He is also the T Boone Pickens Distinguished Scientist at the Center for BrainHealth at University of Texas at Dallas and is a Member of Academia Europaea. A trained clinical psychologist as well as a neuroscientist, he is widely known internationally for his research on cognitive neuroscience and psychology, with over 400 highly cited scientific papers. His popular science writing has included five books aimed at the general reader: Mind Sculpture (2000), The Mind's Eye (2003), Stay Sharp (2005), The Winner Effect (2012) and The Stress Test (2016), and most recently How Confidence Works (2021) all of which have been widely translated. As a highly accomplished clinical psychologist and neuroscientist, few areas of human behaviour are beyond the understanding or scrutiny of renowned professor and speaker, Professor Ian Robertson. His remarkable agility means that he can offer fascinating insights into almost any subject, from the positives of stress, the role of feedback as a leader, to the power of confidence, beating 'impostor syndrome' and the neuroscience of leadership. But it's his experience, empathy and knowledge, combined with humour and his infectious curiosity, that make him such a compelling and entertaining speaker.

A Quality Improvement Project at St. James's Hospital, Dublin - '100% Refer' Organ Donation Model

Nikki Phillips, CNM3 Organ Donation Nurse Manager, Dublin Midlands Hospital Group

Nikki is the Organ Donation Nurse Manager based in St James's Hospital and covering the HSE Dublin and Midlands Region. She qualified as a General Nurse in 2006, Postgraduate Diploma in Intensive Care Nursing 2010, International Masters in Organ Donation and Transplantation with the University of Barcelona 2021. She completed many training courses in Spain on Organ Donation as they are leading worldwide in Organ Donation. She has hosted National Organ Donation Conferences. She has designed and facilitated the First Donation after Circulatory Death simulation in Ireland. As part of a QI initiative, she has created a Donation after Circulatory Death video to aid in education on units around the health regions. She loves to attend rugby matches, she has followed Ireland to the World Cup in France, and hopes to attend the next World Cup in Australia.

Brenda Cullinane, CNM2 Intensive Care Unit, St James's Hospital

Brenda is a Registered General Nurse and has a postgraduate Diploma in Critical Care Nursing. She has experience in multiple ICU's both nationally and internationally and for the last 20 years held the position of CNM 2 in SJH. She also has had previous experience of Acting CNM 3. Brenda takes pride in her role as Lead nurse for Organ Donation link group. She was heavily involved in implementing, leading and driving the introduction of the 100% Referral policy. Brenda trains and competes in Hyrox events and finished 3rd in the recent event in Malaga.

A community based collaborative approach to wound care for homeless clients

Caitriona Doyle, RGN, BSc, Hdip, MSc. CNSp Tissue Viability, CHO Dublin North West

Catriona worked as a renal wound care nurse in a dialysis unit for ten years and she developed the first ever renal specific wound care policy and guidelines within a leading national hospital. She has been working as a Community Tissue Viability Nurse (TVN) now for a year and a half. Alongside the practice development coordinator, she developed a wound care education pack for nurses transitioning from acute care to the community in Dublin North West. TVN lead in national webinar on continence- collaboration with the RCNME Dublin North. When her husband bought a motorbike she secretly took bike lessons to surprise (and quite possibly annoy) him.

Ciara Cotter, CNM2, The Dublin Simon Community

Ciara worked in inpatient adult psychiatry and CAMHS services after graduating from Trinity College Dublin.
