Cathy is a Consultant in Paediatric Intensive Care and Critical Care Retrieval. She is currently the National Clinical Lead for the Irish Paediatric Acute Transport Service (IPATS). Following completion of training in Paediatrics, she completed critical care fellowships in The Hospital for Sick Children, Toronto and Birmingham Children's Hospital, UK. During this time, she developed an interest in end of life care in the critical care setting through her training with the critical care outreach team and in the ICU.

Since taking up her post in PICU and IPATS in April 2016, she has enabled the development of a robust service to facilitate the transfer of critically ill children to a place of their families choosing for end of life care. She is an Associate Clinical Professor of Paediatrics in University College Dublin and plays an active role in undergraduate and postgraduate education. She delivers outreach education to each Regional Unit on the care and transfer of critically ill children on a monthly basis and has developed an extensive website with educational resources to facilitate the standardisation and improvement of the care of critically ill children around the country.



#### Dr. Cilian Ó Maoldomhnaigh Consultant in Paediatric Infectious Diseases, Children's Health Ireland

Cilian is a Paediatric Infectious Disease Consultant working in Children's Health Ireland. He has completed clinical fellowships in Paediatric ID in CHI Crumlin and Hassenfeld Children's Hospital, New York. He was awarded a PhD from Trinity for work performed on neonatal immune responses to tuberculosis and is currently a HRB Postdoctoral Clinical Scientist Fellow. Derek was a member of the Guideline Development Group for INEWS2, and has led out on the implementation of Advanced Nurse Practitioner (ANP) Led Critical Care Outreach Services in all Model 4 Hospitals, and 4 Model 3 Hospitals.

He also sits on the ICU Audit Governance committee, which has made recommendations relating to the implementation of these services. He has a Masters in Healthcare Management and Critical Care Nursing, with over 20 years Clinical Experience in Critical Care.











#### Professor Eva Doherty

Director of Human Factors in Patient Safety, DClinPsych, CClinPsychol (AFPsSI), CPsychol (AFBPsS), PFHEA, FEACH.

Eva is a practising clinical psychologist, Associate Professor and Director of the Human Factors in Patient Safety (HFPS) training, research and assessment programme at the National Surgical Training Centre, Department of Surgical Affairs, RCSI University of Medicine and Health Sciences. The HFPS training is a mandatory component of the postgraduate professional training for surgical, emergency medicine, radiology and ophthalmology trainees. The programme provides interactive workshops for trainees and more recently for consultants on topics which include medical error, risk management, communication, teamwork, conflict resolution, decision-making, open disclosure, emotional intelligence, crisis management, resilience, professionalism and leadership. Eva pioneered and directs the academic Postgraduate Diploma/MSc in Human Factors in Patient Safety which is an inter-professional one/two year part-time online programme.

Eva has over 45 peer reviewed publications on topics relevant to clinical communication issues, personality factors in medical education and assessment. Eva acts as advisor to the National Healthcare Communication Programme in Ireland, HSE. In recognition of Eva's contribution to medical education and to communication training in healthcare, Eva was awarded a Principal Fellowship by the Higher Education Academy in the U.K. and an honorary fellowship by the International Association for Communication in Healthcare.



# Irene Beirne Registered Advanced Nurse Practitioner Neonatology

Irene is an Advanced Nurse Practitioner in Neonatology in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU), University Maternity Hospital Limerick. Contributing to professional development in nursing/midwifery and health policy development at local, regional and national level is within her role. She sits on the 'National Neonatal Resuscitation Working Group' to develop national neonatal resuscitation training standards in maternity hospitals. She also sits on the National Expert Advisory Group for the revision of neonatal guidelines. She provides teaching in the classroom and in the clinical area to both nursing and medical staff as well as presenting at conferences, seminars and workshops to enhance the advanced nursing role.

In 2022 she presented at the ICN international conference, Dublin and the UL Research and Innovation Conference. In 2019 she presented at the International Euro Paediatric conference, Dublin and jENS conference, Maastricht. Irene leads on quality and safety improvement through audit, risk management and standard setting projects. Recent publications, co-authored 'A repeated cross-sectional analysis of breastfeeding initiation rates in Ireland for two decades and 10 recommended priorities for improvement (Maternal and Child Nutrition 2022). Lead author in 'providing culturally sensitive care in the neonatal setting to infants whose parents are from the Irish Traveller Community' (Journal of Transcultural Nursing 2020). Other publications 'Paediatric Research' (2019), 'Archive of Childhood Disease (2019).



# James Powell Surveillance Scientist and 3rd year PhD Candidate

James has been a medical scientist in UL Hospitals for almost 25 years, and a senior medical scientist working on microbial surveillance for 18 of those years. His role is to monitor and report important pathogens that are detected in the laboratory including multi-drug resistant organisms such as MRSA, CPE and VRE, as well as viruses such as SARS-CoV-2, Influenza, Norovirus etc. James maintains databases of these pathogens which are used to inform the local infection prevention and control team, the regional Public Health Department, the National Health Protection Surveillance Centre and other parties. He is passionate about research, has co-authored more than 50 peer reviewed papers and is currently completing his PhD thesis. In his "spare time", James also runs a beef and sheep farm in Tipperary and this gives him a good understanding and a keen interest in the "One Health" concept of human, animal and environmental health.











# John Welch Consultant Nurse in Critical Care and Critical Care Outreach

John is Consultant Nurse in Critical Care and Critical Care Outreach at University Collège London Hospitals - and sepsis lead, theme lead at the National Institute for Health and Care Research Central London Patient Safety Research Collaboration, and Honorary Clinical Lecturer in Advanced Critical Care Practice, University College London. He has previously been President of the International Society for Rapid Response Systems, National Clinical Advisor at NHS England, and UK lead of the EU Horizon 2020 'Nightingale' wireless monitoring development programme. Since 2022, John has been co-lead of the NHS England National Patient Worry & Concern Improvement Collaborative - the precursor to the Martha's Rule programme. He has been an investigator on three completed NIHR studies 'Have interventions aimed at deteriorating patients made an impact?' and 'Psychological Outcomes following a nurse-led Preventative Psychological Intervention', and, most recently, 'Digital alerting to improve sepsis detection and outcome'.

John sits on the Royal College of Physicians National Early Warning Score Advisory Group - writing two editions of the National Early Warning Score - and a US Society of Critical Care Medicine Taskforce. He has been an invited speaker at critical care and patient safety meetings across Europe, the US, and Australia, and in Egypt, Mexico, Singapore, Sri Lanka, and the United Arab Emirates; teaching and reviewing services too.



# **Dr. John Fitzsimons**Consultant Paediatrician at Children's Health Ireland at Temple Street

John is a Consultant Paediatrician with Children's Health Ireland at Temple Street where he is an Honorary Clinical Associate Professor with RCSI. He also works with the HSE National Quality and Patient Safety (NQPS) Directorate as Clinical Director for Quality Improvement (QI) and with the RCPI as lead faculty for QI. He course director of the HSE funded RCPI Quality Improvement and Leadership Post-Graduate certificate which has over 750 graduates and coached more than 250 improvement projects.

He has contributed to national improvement projects including Irish Paediatric Early Warning System (PEWS), Situation Awareness for Everyone (SAFE) and the HSE Patient Safety Strategy 2019-2014. He is a visiting Research Fellow with the Centre for Innovative Human Systems (Human Factors), Trinity College Dublin. He is an editor of the Oxford Handbook of Patient Safety (2022) and a contributor to the Oxford Handbook of Quality Improvement (2024). He is a regular host and contributor to NQPS bi-monthly webinar "QPS TalkTime".



# Juanita Guidera Programme Manager, Staff Engagement for Quality, National Quality and Patient Safety Directorate

Juanita commenced her career in the Irish health service over twenty years ago where she currently works as a Programme Manager within the National Quality and Patient Safety Directorate. In her role, Juanita contributes organisational support and expertise in engagement and patient partnership, communications, programme management, and guideline, policy and legislative review and development as required. She consults to and collaborates with individuals and groups at regional and national level on intervention design, large group facilitation and facilitated educational programmes to improve quality and patient safety.

Karn is currently the Director for Professional Standards for Midwifery and Interim Head of Education with the Nursing and Midwifery Board of Ireland. She had previously worked with NMBI, as Midwife Project Lead, on a part-time basis from July 2023 to December 2023. She was Director of Nursing and Midwifery for Research, Practice Standards and Quality with the Dublin Midlands Hospital Group since November 2022. From June to November 2022, Karn was Interim Chief Director of Nursing and Midwifery for the Dublin Midlands Hospital Group. Karn qualified as a nurse in the Mater Misericordiae Hospital, Dublin and later as a midwife from City University London.

She spent several years in Australia, working as a midwife. While there, she developed an interest in maternal morbidity and mortality. She undertook an MSc in Advance Nursing/Midwifery Practice in Clinical Education, through the James Cook University and wrote a Training Manual for Traditional Birth Attendants in South-East Asia.

On her return from Australia, Karn worked at the University Maternity Hospital Limerick briefly and at Our Lady of Lourdes Hospital, Drogheda. While working in Drogheda, she undertook a Clinical Doctorate in Midwifery through Stirling University, Scotland.

During the pandemic Karn was redeployed to various roles supporting acute settings and Residential Care Facilities on COVID-19 prevention and monitoring initiatives. From January 2021 to December 2022, she led out on the COVID-19 vaccination programme for Dublin Midlands Hospital Group and the Citywest Vaccination Centre. Kate is the Director of the National Patient Safety Office (NPSO). The NPSO provides leadership and strategic direction to deliver key patient safety policy objectives for Ireland, working closely with a wide range of stakeholders and organisations both nationally and internationally.

Kate took up the role of NPSO Director in April 2023, having worked in a number of other roles in the Department over the previous decade.

Kate led the implementation of the cross-Government Healthy Ireland initiative from 2013 to 2020.
