Free chickenpox vaccine now available for babies born on or after 1 October 2024

Background

The HSE has announced a series of changes to the primary childhood immunisation schedule for all babies born on or after 1 October 2024. This includes the introduction of the chickenpox (varicella) vaccine.

Your child's date of birth will decide which schedule they are on.

- If they are born on or before *30th September 2024*, then the existing childhood schedule will apply even if they need to catch-up. There is no chickenpox vaccine available in this schedule.
- If they are born on or after 1st October they will be offered a new childhood schedule, the chickenpox vaccine is available on this schedule and is recommended when babies are 12 months of age

There are no changes to the number of GP visits required. They remain at 2, 4, 6, 12 and 13 months.

For babies on the new schedule, NIAC recommend a second varicella vaccine, to be given when children are aged 4-5 years in Junior Infants as a combined MMR and varicella vaccine, MMRV.

This is part of the schools' immunisation programme. This programme will be implemented in 2029/2030.



Free chickenpox vaccine now available for babies born on or after 1 October 2024

Key messages

Primary

- 1. If your baby is born on and after the 1st October you will be offered a new vaccine schedule.
- 2. If your baby is born on and after the 1st October you will be offered the Varicella (Chickenpox) vaccine as part of the new baby vaccine schedule when they are 12 months old.


- 1. Childhood diseases are preventable through vaccination.

Childhood Immunisation Schedules





Following the correct schedule and making sure your baby completes the recommended vaccines ensures they have important protection from many potentially serious and preventable diseases.





Dr Chantal Migone, Consultant in Public Health Medicine the HSE National Immunisation Office said,

"We are delighted that the chickenpox vaccine is now part of the routine childhood immunisation schedule as has been recommended by the National Immunisation Advisory Committee (NIAC). All babies born from 1 October 2024 will be offered the new childhood immunisation schedule, which includes chickenpox vaccine at 12 months of age".

"Many parents might consider chickenpox to be a mild illness, but for some babies chickenpox and its complications can be very serious, resulting in hospitalisation for 170 cases last year, and in rare cases even death. Adding the chickenpox vaccine to the routine immunisation schedule will ensure the best protection for babies, and far fewer serious cases of the disease."

"The immunisation schedule remains with five separate GP visits, at 2, 4, 6, 12 and 13 months. Following the schedule and making sure your baby completes the recommended vaccines on time every time ensures they have important protection from many potentially serious and preventable diseases."



Chickenpox: What is national the data telling us?

Only hospitalised cases of chickenpox are <u>notified to HPSC.</u>

In 2023, there were 170 cases of hospitalised chickenpox notified in Ireland, the highest number notified in recent years.

- o 2022 75 cases
- o 2021 23 cases
- o 2020 21 cases
- o 2019 93 cases
- o 2018 99 cases
- Cases of hospitalised chickenpox are highest in the 1-9 year old age group
- Chickenpox infection can result in serious illness.
- Since 2018, there have been four cases of meningitis and 10 cases of encephalitis-related chickenpox reported
- Chickenpox has also been identified as a risk factor for invasive Group A Streptococcus (iGAS) infection which can lead to sepsis and can be fatal
- During the increase in iGAS cases in 2023, of 532 iGAS cases reported:
- 29 were also reported as being hospitalised Chickenpox cases
- Chickenpox was listed as a risk factor in a further 51 iGAS cases.


