Be proud of what you do, encourage your colleagues, set high standards and enjoy your work. We are privileged to work in the Irish healthcare system.

Advanced Paramedics on Tour in West Cork

A major development taking place in the ambulance services in West Cork is the deployment of a team of advanced paramedics to the area this month. The advanced paramedics will respond to emergency calls in rapid response vehicles and are an addition to the existing ambulance personnel and fleet in West Cork.

Before taking up duty advanced paramedics, Kieran Henry, Mick Lynch, Peter Dullea and Alan Sheehan and training officer, Danny O'Regan are visiting schools, business associations, sporting clubs and key staff groups in the locality.

According to Kieran "we are out there in the local community raising awareness and informing people of the skills and experience that we will bring to the area. Questions and comments from school kids have been fascinating, they are already well informed on medical terms and techniques. Many transition year students have already completed basic first aid skills including CPR techniques so they are very interested in what we are able to do."

With at least six years experience under their belt in the ambulance services, advanced paramedics have undertaken high level education and training which

enables them to perform a range of complex medical procedures. These include advanced airway management (inserting a tube into a patient's lungs to help them breathe [intubation]), insertion of IV fluids (drips) and administration of medications such as pain relief and anti-convulsing therapies.

Advanced paramedics can also perform advanced life support (ALS), a component of the Chain of Survival which increases a patient's chance of recovery during cardiac arrest. Of the four components in this internationally recognised Chain only three (early access, early CPR and early defib) were available round the clock in West Cork so the fourth early ALS will be a welcome addition.

According to Danny "our advanced paramedics will be available, seven days a week in the area waiting on a call out. When someone dials 999 or 112 the ambulance controller may decide to dispatch an advanced paramedic to the emergency scene.

"The advanced paramedics will have their own transport, a Rapid Response Vehicle (RRV), which will allow them to travel rapidly to the emergency scene. The RRVs are fully equipped with medical equipment to respond to every type of an emergency."

So far reports are very positive from the schools and groups that they have visited. During the month they were witnessed promising to assist the Castletownbere Coastguard Cliff and Coastal Rescue teams in their mountain searches and attending to a pupil in a school during one presentation. We wish them luck in their endeavours in West Cork!

Haemochromatosis genetic testing begins at CUH

CUH's Pathology Department is now offering haemochromatosis (an iron storage disorder) genetic testing. A small part of a person's genetic makeup is examined to give additional information on their risk of having or carrying this iron storage disorder. While colleagues at Kerry General Hospital have been successfully providing the service in their own immediate locality for some time the Cork testing was being outsourced to the UK.

The service has been introduced at CUH as part of the reconfiguration programme. A clinical sub-group chaired by Dr. John O'Mullane, Consultant Clinical Biochemist, was established in April and the testing was up and running by August, which according to Dr. O'Mullane, "shows the potential for quick action and prompt service delivery when interested parties come together and agree on forward progress".

According to Dr. O'Mullane, "the group worked quickly and efficiently, agreed guidelines and a strict protocol and conducted most of the work via electronic means of communication."

Dr. O'Mullane intends to "conduct a clinical and financial audit after three months which will allow appropriate corrective actions and adjustments to be made to the service."
